ANCIENT STUDIES PROGRAM 2024-2025

Founded in 1971, Ancient Studies is one of the oldest interdisciplinary programs at St. Olaf College. Most courses focus on ancient Greece, Rome, and the Near East, a few on ancient China or Japan. Students are encouraged to examine the ancient world from a variety of perspectives, including comparative and cross-cultural ones.

It is common for students to combine an Ancient Studies major with another major such as philosophy, religion, history, art history, or political science. Even students majoring in math, natural science, or fine arts may opt to use Ancient Studies as half of a double major.

Every Ancient Studies major must complete Greek 253 (or any other Greek course above 231) or Latin 235 (or any other Latin course above 231). Students who fulfill this requirement with Latin may use one Greek course (111 or above) as an elective; those who fulfill it with Greek may use one Latin course (111 or above) as an elective.

Also required are a Classics course, an ancient history course (for which a Classics GHS course may be substituted), four electives selected from Art and Art History, Asian Studies, Classics, Enduring Questions, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Religion, and Theater, and either Classics 370 or an Independent Research on a topic of the student's choice (e.g., the chronology of Jericho, Egyptian pyramid design, midwifery in antiquity, Old Nubian, Plato's political philosophy, ancient fly-fishing). A paper written for a Level III course may replace the IR. Study abroad and courses at Carleton College extend the range of possibilities.
